In accordance with Sections 2272 and 2279 of the California Food and Agriculture Code, I am happy to submit the 2015 Sacramento County Annual Crop and Livestock Report. This report includes the acreage, production and gross value of agricultural commodities in Sacramento County as well as the invasive pest activities and our response to those pests. In this report you will find the "farmgate" values which are based upon the most common first point of sale of the commodity. The values in this report are gross values and in no way reflect net income because they do not take into account the various costs of production, marketing, or transportation.

2015 represented our fourth year of severe drought and that is finally demonstrated in our crop production value of \$469,947,546 which represents a 6.4% decrease from the adjusted 2014 figure of \$502,274,000 (a record high). Although the drought did negatively affect the yields of some of our crops, another major contributing factor to our lower farmgate was the decrease in prices for many of our commodities in 2015. It should be noted that many of the 2015 lower commodity prices had increased significantly in 2014 so this may be a re-adjustment to more of a normal price.

Sacramento County agriculture demonstrated stability in 2015 as the top ten commodities remain the same and their proportion of the County's agricultural value remained stable as well. All but two of our top ten commodities had a decrease in value. The largest decreases were in milk and field corn. Field corn production dropped 25% and the price per ton dropped 12.7% and milk production dropped 8% and its price per unit dropped almost 30%. Pears also showed a significant decrease (-20%) with a drop in both production and price per ton but Sacramento still remains the top pear producing county in California. Our top commodity, wine grapes, increased in acreage but most likely due to the drought decreased a bit in yield and the price decreased slightly as well.

Livestock was a bright spot in 2015 with a 60% increase in the value of our aquaculture production and it remains in our top ten commodities. Although the price in cattle and calves remained strong and even increased, many cattlemen had already thinned their herds due to the drought (production was down almost 10%) and the cattle were not carrying the weight that they did last year so we were unable to take advantage of that strong price and turned in a 13% decrease for 2015. The rest of our livestock showed increases in value so that overall, livestock values increased more than 12% over 2014.

I would like to thank the growers, producer organizations, and government agencies that provide the information that allows us to compile this report. I would also like to express my appreciation to our staff members, Laura McCready and Ramona Saunders, who worked so hard on this report and to our IT Analyst, Vicki Brewer, for the report design.



#### PEST DETECTION

In 2015, hundreds of Japanese beetle monitoring traps were again placed in Carmichael and Fair Oaks to assess the extent of infestation in both communities. The beetle infestation in Fair Oaks was first discovered in 2010 and beetles continued to be trapped in 2011 and 2012. In 2013, no beetles were detected in traps, but in 2014, 3 more beetles were detected, disappointing agricultural officials and homeowners alike. Treatment took place on all of the properties where beetles were found and on all neighboring properties within 200 meters. In 2015, no beetles were found in Fair Oaks.

In Carmichael, after extensive treatments took place in 2014 on positive properties and those within 200 meters, hopes ran high that in 2015 no more beetles would be found. Unfortunately, 7 beetles were trapped in early summer of 2015 in Carmichael and once again, pesticide treatments were performed in an effort to eradicate the pest.

In late 2015, a scientific advisory panel convened at CDFA headquarters to discuss and review eradication response methods and create draft advisory recommendations. Presentations regarding the biology and history of the pest were made and public comment was taken. The meeting was well attended and the scientific advisory panel later offered their recommendations.
